the Military Donations!!! I am sure that many of our service people will enjoy the Care Packages. The Dancing Angels meet often on Saturday mornings to work on various


projects together. One Saturday morning in July they gathered to make cards to send along with the other donations.



# What Is Palmetto House and Why Are We Involved?

Most of you have heard about Palmetto House, but do you really *know* about Palmetto House?

The Palmetto House is a transitional living facility for people who for various reasons have no place to live and are recommended by a social worker, who screens them to find out if they fit the criteria. Before residing at Palmetto House the residents were without a home; maybe they just came out of a rehabilitation program or maybe they lost their job and have no place to live. Whatever the reason, they have found a home at Palmetto House.

Once they are accepted as a resident, they must follow the "house rules": no drinking, no drugs, they must have a job or are training for a job or taking courses to improve or gain new skills. This place is truly a "safety net" for many people. Each and every resident that we have met throughout the years has worked hard to better themselves to be able to move on and become functioning and independent members of the community again.

POUCC has been involved in Palmetto House since 1997. We have met some wonderful people but the greatest reward is to see them when they are able to move on and into their own place. The Feeding Program has shown the residents that **other people care about them** and this is a big morale booster for them. We have watched so many of them move on and though we are sad not to see them anymore we are thrilled that they have moved forward toward their goal of independence!!

Recently, one of the residents died after a battle with cancer and we went to the service for him. We were so moved by the people who live there who had just lost a member of their "family." Many people from Feeding Teams, including us, were there supporting each other. That is what happens there. It is truly a miracle for some of them because without the residents of Palmetto House and the Teams that come in daily to feed them they, in all probability, would have wound up back on the street, struggling and all alone again.

Here is a poem, written by one of the residents several years ago, who shared it with me. I found it in my file of Palmetto House. This will help you to understand how important it is that we continue to serve meals there.

The chili was mighty tasty; in fact it was downright fine! I'm sure it filled everyone's stomach, and not only mine.

You served it with a special smile, and with such a loving touch. The very fact that you did it - means so very much.

### Meatball Stroganoff

1 pkg. frozen, precooked Meatballs, defrosted (I use Publix cooked Italian Meatballs)

1 large can of Beef Gravy

1/3 cup Sour Cream

2 Tbs. Dijon Mustard (I use Hellman's Dijonaise Mustard)

Put meatballs in a casserole dish. In a medium bowl mix together gravy, sour cream and Dijon mustard and pour over the meatballs. Mix well and bake in a 350° oven until bubbling (about 25 minutes.) You can also microwave until it bubbles or heat them in a large pot on the stove over medium-low heat for 20-25 minutes.

Can be served over egg noodles cooked according to package directions. Serves 6.

## Tom Taylor Honored

Tom Taylor, son of Jeanne and brother of Kay Taylor, was honored posthumously in the May-June, 2011 publication of the Lighthouse Digest, the leading journal of lighthouse history and restoration which enjoys international "Remembering Tom Taylor: Historian, circulation. Visionary, Lighthouse Leader" is a prominent article written by Rick Schulze, a fellow lighthouse enthusiast who knew Tom and his important work very well. Tom was the lighthouse historian at Ponce de Leon Inlet Lighthouse for over seven years, during which time he was one of the founders and president of the Florida Lighthouse Association, a non-profit organization which actively restores and maintains 30 historic lighthouses in the state of Florida. When Tom passed away at age 55, he was living in Marathon, Florida and forging a new non-profit organization call The Florida Keys Reef Lights Foundation, which is dedicated to saving the reef lights off the Florida Keys, most of which were built in the 1850's and offer a great legacy of maritime history filled with excitement. Both The Florida Lighthouse Association (www.floridalighthouses.org) and Florida Liahts Foundation Keys Reef (www.reeflights.org) have growing memberships and continue the important endeavor of restoring lighthouses and promoting maritime history. Take time to check these The membership fees are very organizations out. affordable for either group; the people are wonderful, intelligent and friendly and the lighthouse meetings, held throughout the year at various lighthouse sites, offer interesting adventures and lots of information and privileges such as special access to lighthouses not open to the public.

Tom Taylor, who won many awards throughout his lifetime as an historian, including an award from the Volusia County Anthropological Society, was also the author of historical books and articles and a number of lighthouse books. Three of his books: *Monhegan Island and Its Lighthouse; The Key West Lighthouse: A Light in Paradise;* and *Lore of* 

the Reef Lights: Life in the Florida Keys are available from www.InfinityPublishing.com or from Buy the Book at 1-877-BUY-BOOK. Tom's book, Florida Lighthouse Trail is available from www.PineapplePress.com. And his book, Florida's Territorial Lighthouses, widely considered one of the premier books on lighthouse history, is available through me, Kay Taylor, 5123 Orange Avenue, Port Orange, FL 32127. We thank Rick Schulze and the Lighthouse Digest for remembering Tom and promoting his work in this wonderful article!


